ENGLISH



Hi, my name is Yuan, and today I will talk about my chess history. I first decided to start playing chess because I always thought it would be a fun way to be smarter and to not be left out whilst other people knew how to play it. Chess also helped me in problem-solving because it made me think about future possibilities if I ever made a choice. This skill has been invaluable in different areas of my life.

Through my Chess Masters experience, I have learned to decode complex positions, apply logical reasoning, and stay mentally composed under pressure. My most memorable win was in one of the recent tournaments, where I beat a player in just four moves and in less than 30 seconds. This victory was something that truly surprised me. Usually, I face many tough opponents, and I focus on staying calm while carefully considering my moves. These high-pressure games can be stressful, so I rely on my past experiences and strategies to guide me.

To continuously improve, I often play chess on Chess.com or watch others play while picking up useful tips and strategies. I have also developed a deeper understanding of various openings and methods. Additionally, I sometimes play chess with my cousin to refine my skills and apply new techniques I've learned.

Name : Maha 7 Title : Fox




